Do your magic, Harry Potter!

popular fiction books and their impact on students' reading performances

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3rd reading habits survey conducted in 2020

Aim: Further insights into the relationship of students' reading habits and their reading comprehension skill

Questions (selection):

- last 3 printed books read in leisure time
- last 3 e-books read in leisure time
- frequency of reading literature in leisure time
- language preference for reading

Who: all G7 & G9 students who participated in the Luxembourg school monitoring programme *Épreuves Standardisées* (ÉpStan): G7: 3055; G9: 5781.

2. Key findings

Printed books:

Novels: Students read international best sellers (they know from the movies?) and/or fiction books they probably read in classes Graphic-Novels and Mangas: predominating in G7, but not in G9: Why? a) images provide support for younger students?

G9 students mostly indicate school books (=novels)? b)

3 different sub-types of fiction books with a differing relationship between text and image elements were identified:

- **Novel:** text based narrations (like Harry Potter)
- **Graphic-Novel:** hybrid mixture of drawings & text (like GT)



Competencies assessed in ÉpStan (G7 & G9):

- German reading comprehension
- French reading comprehension
- Mathematics (German or French)

Key findings from previous surveys:

- Many G7 students (43%) and the majority of G9 students (58%) prefer digital reading activities on social media over classical reading activities (reception of printed text).
- Reading social media has a positive impact on students' reading competencies, as it is one way of language contact / read practice.
- But the strongest positive impact exerts the reception of ", classic" literary texts.

3.1 differing text features

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Text

Novel By default: 3rd person narrator Written standard language: long & complex sentences, precise description

Manga: image-based narrations (like Naruto / Boruto)

E-books:

Most striking finding: students don't read on e-books. (G7: 64%, G9: 83%)

TEXT

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of context information (e.g., background knowledge about the fictional world the story takes place in)


- > high information density
- Accompanied by elements of spoken language (literal speech)
- Exclusively text based narration, structured by chapters, headlines and paragraphs.


Graphic-Novel

- 1st person narrator, who is part of the fictional world
- Very colloquial literal speech with many idiomatic phrases ("Aus'm Weg, ihr Pimpfe!"), but also complex syntactical structures and long sentences
- Literal speech only as a part of images
- "Key words" and literal speech always in capital letters, as a replacement for intonation
- Hybrid mixture of drawings and text: Images support text content, they illustrate what has been written before!

3.2 Most popular text types and ÉpStan score (t-test: p-value < 0.05)







Manga

- No real narrative voice, but an imagebased scenery with short dialogues and minimal context information
- great variety of onomatopoetica ("written sound effects"): about 7% of written content (p.1-10)
- structured by standardized reading flow (Japanese) & guiding text elements (e.g., sentences, split up on two or more images)
- Text elements in capital letters only
- image based narration, but text essential for understanding: text and image both transport crucial information!
